## JACOBY 2NT

After an opening of $1 \bullet / \wedge$, a bid of 2 NT is $12+\mathrm{pts}$ (no upper limit), showing a 4 card fit and investigates slam.

The Opener replies as follows:

| 3* | $=\dagger$ shortage | 4* | = a 5-card suit |
| :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: |
| 3 | - * shortage | 4 * | = a 5 card suit |
| 3 other major | $=$ shortage | $4 \vee$ (if $\uparrow$ 's bid) | = a 5-card suit |

With no shortage or $2^{\text {nd }}$ suit, the opener replies as follows:

3 \text { of the major } & \text { : encouraging } \\
3 \mathrm{NT} & : \text { average } \\
4 \text { of the major } & \text { : discouraging }
\end{array}
$$

Some people play the jump shift to show a void, but you can do that by subsequently cue bidding the suit. So showing a $2^{\text {nd }}$ suit (a potential source of tricks) is the most popular treatment.
